When the season of Maungaharuru opens, the season of Tangitū closes, When the season of Tangitū opens, the season of Maungaharuru closes.

This whakatauākī is carved on the waharoa to our Marae. It describes the takiwā of our Hapū – Maungaharuru in the west, to Tangitū in the east. It also describes the mahinga kai of our Hapū. The ngahere on Maungaharuru was the source of food for our Hapū in winter. Tangitū was, and remains, the source of food in the summer. While our Hapū collected food on a seasonal basis, we were blessed in that we did not need to leave our takiwā in search of food.

Another Hapū whakatauākī refers to the movement of our Hapū within our takiwā to gather seasonal kai:

ko tō rātau pā kai ngā rekereke



Ko Maungaharuru te maunga

Hōngongoi July 2017



Kia haruru a Maungaharuru (let the great mountain reverberate) "Maungaharuru" means the mountain that rumbled and roared. It was named when Tūpai, a tohunga on the waka Tākitimu, cast the staff called Papauma onto our maunga. Papauma embodied the mauri of birdlife and the maunga rumbled and roared on receiving this sacred taonga. It is also said that the mountain roared every morning and evening as the many birds took flight and returned again.


Ko Tūtira te roto

Ko te waiū o ō tātau tīpuna (the milk of our ancestors) This whakatauākī refers to the abundance of kai that could be sourced from Tūtira and also refers to the lake providing spiritual sustenance. Accordingly, the physical and spiritual wellbeing of our Hapū is closely linked to the wellbeing of Lake Tūtira.


Ko Te Ngarue te awa

Te Ngarue e rere ana (Te Ngarue flowing) Te Ngarue is the stream that runs alongside Tangoio Marae. In it lives a kaitiaki of the same name, which takes the form of a tuna. It is highly regarded by our Hapū and is carved on the front left of our whare tipuna. The awa provided a wealth of kai to sustain our Hapū and was particularly abundant with tuna and inanga.

Our whare, Maungaharuru, has been used for multiple purposes over the years including sleeping, dining, whakamoemiti and hui. It housed the Kōhanga Reo, hauora, engineering and other training programmes. Our evidence for the Waitangi Tribunal was heard in Maungaharuru. This whare was blessed in 1991, the same year as Punanga Te Wao was opened.

It was opened on 9 April 1955 by Tā Eruera Tirikatene. Our Hapū put in a huge effort in fundraising over 12 years to build Tangitū. This whare is important as the place where we manaaki our manuhiri.



Most of our Hapū are named after tīpuna: Marangatūhetaua, Tauira, and Te Ruruku. Ngāti Kurumōkihi was previously called Ngāi Tatara, named after our tipuna Tataramoa. He is the tekoteko on top of our whare tipuna. Marangatūhetaua is the koruru and Tauira and Te Ruruku are carved in the mahau.

Ko Kahungunu he tangata ahuwhenua

(Kahungunu is an industrious man)

This carving depicts Kahungunu, Rongomaiwahine and their first-born tamaiti Kahukuranui. Our Hapū descend from the original inhabitants who occupied our lands long before the arrival of Ngāti Kahungunu. Ngāti Kahungunu migrated to our lands and our connections with them were strengthened through marriage alliances over many generations. Consequently, we identify Ngāti Kahungunu as our iwi.
